Annual Budget Cycle Officially Commences

Budget meetings are officially underway as the County begins work on the 2027 budget. With revenue-neutral tax years on the horizon for 2027 and 2028 and rising costs of mandated services, the Commissioners are working closely with department heads and elected row offices to control and reduce costs and seek other funding sources, such as grants, to balance the budget.

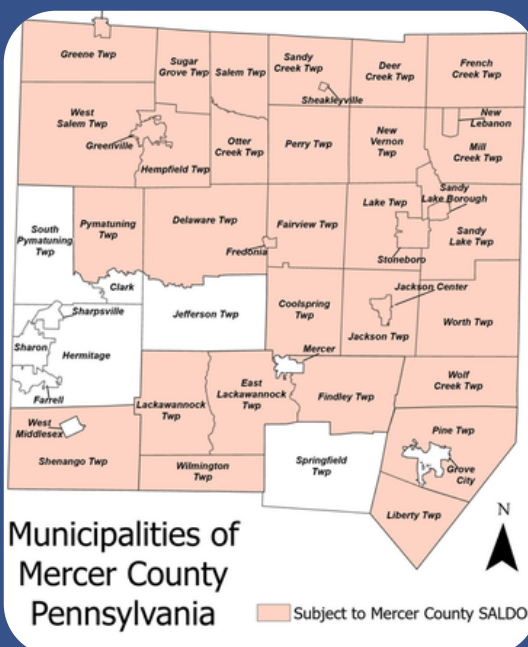


Mercer County Heard Residents' Concerns and Acted on Data Center Development

As interest in data center development continues to grow, Mercer County residents have raised important questions about potential impacts, including noise, water usage, setbacks, traffic, land use, and other concerns associated with large-scale industrial development.

The Mercer County Commissioners heard those concerns and took action. Working with residents, municipalities, and the Mercer County Regional Planning Commission (MCRPC), the County held two public hearings in June and July to receive public input on proposed amendments to the Mercer County Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO). Following that public process, the Commissioners formally adopted the amendments on July 30, 2026.

DEPARTMENT SPOTLIGHT: INSIDE COUNTY GOVERNMENT

The Intermediate Punishment Program (IPP) provides alternatives to traditional sentences of incarceration and probation for non-violent offenders who do not pose a threat to society. IPP allows offenders to remain in the community while serving their sentences and repaying their debt to society.

Some of the goals of the IPP program include providing

- Less restrictive and expensive sentencing options while maintaining public safety
- Community-based sanctions
- Alternative community-based programs in lieu of incarceration

The IPP Department administers many different programs. Some of the more well-known programs are House Arrest, Community Service, and IP Supervision. Mercer County is one of only two counties in Pennsylvania that does not have a county probation office. IP Supervision is an option that allows judges to have non-violent offenders serve their probation locally instead of with the PA Board of Probation and Parole.

IPP also oversees the very successful Treatment Court programs. Mercer County has three active Treatment Courts: Veterans Court, Drug Treatment Court, and Mental Health Court. These are diversionary courts for specific populations. Participants participate in very intensive treatment programs with their peers.



Tyler Shoaf is the director of the Intermediate Punishment Program. He has worked for Mercer County for 14 years.

COMMISSIONERS MONTHLY UPDATE (con't)

One of the highlights of the month was participating in the 4-H Round-Up, where the Commissioners Ann Coleman, Bill Finley, and Tim McGonigle had the opportunity to judge an animal and kid costume contest, meet with young people, and see firsthand the tremendous effort, creativity, and dedication demonstrated by Mercer County's 4-H members. Supporting programs like 4-H is an investment in the next generation of leaders and helps young people develop responsibility, confidence, and valuable life skills.

The Commissioners also had the privilege of joining the City of Farrell and the Borough of Fredonia to celebrate significant community anniversaries. Farrell celebrated their 125th anniversary and Fredonia celebrated their 150th anniversary. These celebrations provide an opportunity to recognize the history, traditions, organizations, businesses, and residents that have helped make Mercer County a great place to live.

At the same time, work continues behind the scenes on several important county initiatives. The Commissioners are continuing to advance the County's radio project, an important effort focused on improving communications and strengthening public safety capabilities throughout Mercer County. Reliable communications are essential for our first responders, emergency personnel, and the residents they serve. Work is underway on the tower sites and decisions are being made regarding how the new radio channels will be organized.

The County is also examining ways to improve energy efficiency in its courthouse buildings. The goal is to identify opportunities to reduce energy consumption and operating costs while maintaining safe, comfortable, and functional facilities. Responsible stewardship means looking not only at what a project costs today, but also at its potential long-term savings and benefits to taxpayers.

Financial stewardship remains another important priority. The Commissioners are actively negotiating better rates and returns on County investments, seeking to maximize the income generated from available County funds while maintaining appropriate security and liquidity. Even small improvements in investment returns can make a meaningful difference to the County's bottom line over time.

These activities reflect the broad scope of the Commissioners' responsibilities. Some of the work is highly visible—such as attending community celebrations and supporting our 4-H youth—while other efforts involve careful planning, negotiations, and long-term decision-making.

Whether investing in our young people, celebrating the communities that make Mercer County special, improving public safety communications, reducing operating costs, or protecting taxpayer resources, the Commissioners remain focused on serving our residents today while planning responsibly for Mercer County's future.

Data Center Development Con't:

The County SALDO applies in 36 municipalities and establishes minimum standards for land development projects within its jurisdiction. In municipalities that do not have their own zoning ordinance, the County SALDO is the only tool for ensuring that land development is subject to established standards. Not every municipality will choose to adopt its own zoning ordinance, making the County SALDO an important baseline for responsible land development and community protection.

While the County SALDO establishes minimum development standards, municipalities with their own zoning ordinances have additional authority to determine where specific types of land uses are permitted and to establish local zoning requirements. Of Mercer County's 47 municipalities, 29 have their own zoning ordinances, and seven are currently reviewing or updating their regulations to address land-use districts and appropriate locations for emerging types of development.

The City of Sharon has its own zoning and land-development regulations and served as the approving authority for the Keel Data Center project. The MCRPC reviewed the proposal and provided comments as part of its planning and review responsibilities.

The Commissioners' actions demonstrate their commitment to listening to residents, responding to legitimate community concerns, and planning responsibly for future development. Mercer County recognizes that economic development can provide important opportunities for jobs and investment, while also recognizing the importance of protecting the character, quality of life, and long-term interests of our communities.
